# Honoring a Legacy in the Industry

DFNB proudly shares that the New Brunswick Dairy Hall of Fame is now featured on our website. Established in 1984, the Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have made lasting contributions to the dairy industry through leadership in areas like production, education, research, marketing, and policy.

As we launch this new page, we also honour the recent passing of Derek Stephen Roberts, a 2016 inductee known for his transformative impact on dairy processing in New Brunswick. Derek began his career at Farmers Dairy Cooperative in Nova Scotia before joining Dairytown Products Ltd. in Sussex in 1985. As General Manager and CEO, Derek introduced world-class production standards and led the company through major growth and diversification—including the acquisition of Dunster's Donuts and R&G Transport.

Under his leadership, Dairytown achieved international recognition, including the World's Best Butter award in 2004, and was the first food processor in the region to receive HACCP accreditation. In 2014, he helped guide the merger of Dairytown with Agropur, securing long-term market stability for New Brunswick producers.


# **Market Update**

The CDC publishes a monthly market update on the public facing side of their website. These reports are available at the following link:

#### **Overview of May 2025:**

- Total Requirements forecast shows an average growth of between 1.6% and 2.6% for April 2026.
- Total Requirements for the 12 months ending May 2025 were 3.22% higher than those of the previous 12 months and saw a 5.25% increase since April 2025.
- Compared to April 2025, apparent consumption decreased for milk, cream, yogurt and cheese, while it increased for ice cream and butter. For the 12 months ending May 2025 all products saw an increase in consumption.
- Total Quota increased from April 2025 by 4.4% and had an increase of 3.4% for the 12 months ending May 2025.
- P10 production decreased by 1.12% in May compared to April 2025. but saw an increase of 2.9% for the 12 months ending in May 2025.
- Butter stocks decreased in May 2025 by 1,521 tonnes to 39,442 tonnes. Butter stocks are expected to be between 44,634 and 49814 tonnes in April 2026.

# P5 Message

### Changes in Solids-Non-Fat (SNF) Tier 2 Prices Payment Policy

The P5 Boards have approved the following change in the price paid for SNF in tier 2:

- Protein: monthly 4a price
- Lactose and other solids: \$0.90/kg

SNF below the 2.00 SNF/BF market ratio will continue to be paid at within-quota rates, as per the payment policy. The change in price will be effective on May 1, 2025, in Ontario and Prince Edward Island and effective on August 1, 2025, in Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The P5 Quota Committee will continue to evaluate the payment policy and update its parameters as necessary, to ensure objectives continue to be met.

# **Profilab Update**

Milk 2020's funding of Profilab testing and the Profilab tool that started August 1, 2024 comes to an end on July 31, 2025.

Those farms who wish to continue this service after July 31, 2025 will need to sign up for the service and be subject to a monthly fee for service.

The monthly fee is estimated to be between \$45 to \$80 per month depending on the number of farms that sign up to the service.

A sign up sheet was emailed to all producers July 9 to help DFNB determine if there is sufficient interest for the labs to provide this service.

DFNB will inform producers of the final monthly fee once it knows the level of interest.

# NATURAL PRODUCTS ACT REGULATIONS

Plans for construction, extension, alteration, installation or replacement

50(1) Plans for the construction, extension or alteration of a dairy farm, including a dairy barn, milking parlour or milk house, shall be submitted to the Commission or an inspector for approval before the work is undertaken.

50(2) Plans for the installation or replacement of a farm bulk tank shall be submitted to the Commission or an inspector for approval before the work is undertaken.

Bulk milk graders are trained and licensed to grade milk. They only reject milk according to regulations. Once rejected a producer is required to dispose of that milk and correct the problem that contributed to the rejection and clean their tank before adding their next milking.

Producers are welcome to reach out to the public safety inspectors for assistance in determining the causes for the rejections.

#### MILK PENALTY FUNDING

Pro-active funding: Producers advised of second or subsequent milk quality infraction, prior to a penalty assessed, is allowed to offset, once per year, cost of a visit from milk quality technician to a maximum of \$1000. Producers may apply for funding by forwarding paid invoices to DFNB office.



#### **QUOTA CORNER**

#### **Quota Exchange Procedures**

Bids/Offers must be submitted on forms provided prior to 4:00 p.m. on 1st working day of month. All bids must be accompanied by confirmation of funds from your lending institution if bid is greater than prior month's "Due Producer". Producers will not be allowed to combine their "Due Producer" amount with their confirmation of funds from a financial institution to bid for quota equal to the combined amounts. Bids or offers above \$24,000 will not be accepted. Producers selling all of their quota on an exchange will be subject to a security deposit of \$1000/kg that will be returned 30 days after effective date of the transfer.

#### Minimum Quota Holdings Policy


The Board will cease picking milk up when the farm's total daily quota falls below ten (10) kilograms.

<u>An over quota penalty of \$20/hl is in effect.</u>

#### Daily Quota Transfer Order

Section 3 b) j); Producers must pay the Board the QESP for the Daily Quota so purchased on or before noon of the 20th day of the month or noon of the first working day thereafter if the 20th falls on a holiday or weekend. Payment received after that is subject to a 2% penalty applied on the value of the purchased Daily Quota and deducted from the producer's statement. The producer will also be prohibited from purchasing on the following month's exchange. If payment is not received by the last working day of month, that purchased quota will be revoked and be offered for sale on the next month's exchange. Any losses incurred from the resale of the revoked Daily Quota will be charged back to the producer along with an additional 2% penalty.

#### **CREDIT CORNER**

#### <u>Credit Exchange Procedures</u>

Bids/Offers must be submitted on forms provided prior to 4:00 p.m. on the 2nd working day after the 15th of the month.

Results are available on the morning of 4th working day after the 15th. Producers exiting industry may purchase/sell credits one month following effective date of sale. If you do not receive your statement in time to review your credit position, please call the office and we will fax /email your statement to you.

18,591 of the 19,979 wanted at or below the CESP were purchased.

Effective May 1, 2025 the 0-day limit was removed which allowed producers to buy or sell regardless of their credit positions.


At a later date, producers with quality penalties will also have the percentage of credits that they can buy reduced for a number of months. DFNB will notify producers 2 months prior to this policy taking effect.

#### **BULK MILK TANKS**

All bulk milk tanks needing calibrated will be coordinated by DFNB staff using the calibration services of both Dairy Farmers of Ontario (DFO). If you are planning to install a new tank or have installed one recently, please call 432-4330 so your farm can be added to the schedule. Before replacing your bulk milk tank remember: New tanks of 1000 US gallons (3780 liters) must have a minimum outlet of 3 inches with a butterfly valve; New tanks less than 1000 must have a minimum tank outlet of 2 inches with a butterfly valve; Used tanks of any size must have a minimum tank outlet of 2 inches with a butterfly valve.

### **CYBER SECURITY RISKS AND RESOURCES:**

Safeguarding Canadian agriculture and agri-food

As agricultural and agri-food businesses become more digitized and connected online, the need to safeguard against cybercrime increases. Precision agriculture, automation and smart farming technologies contribute to efficiency and productivity, but without proper safeguards, the door opens to cyber vulnerabilities that can range from disruptive to devastating effects, including paralyzing business and impacting profitability and consumer trust.

In this digital landscape, it's critical to understand and guard against cyber risks.





#### What is cyber security?

Cyber security is the practice of safeguarding computer systems, networks and data from digital disruptions. Examples of cyber incidents affecting the agriculture and agri-food industry include fraudulent texts, phishing emails that seek to gain private info and access to systems, and ransomware demands, to name just a few.



#### What agricultural systems are at risk?

Targets can include production, financial, customer and other data, wireless sensors, automated and robotic machinery, autonomous and semiautonomous vehicles and equipment, and heating, refrigeration, lighting and ventilation controls and systems.



# Quick tips to minimize your risk

- o Have different passwords for each account, preferably 12 characters-long, including 1 upper and 1 lower case letter, and 1 special character. Change passwords frequently.
- o Enable multi-factor authentication on all your accounts, wherever possible.
- o Back up vital information regularly, including vendor and client data and information. Store backup information offline or in an external drive.
- o Don't open unknown emails, and don't click on links or attachments unless you're sure of their origin and legitimacy.
- o Don't save personal or financial data on browsers if prompted and avoid auto-fill features.
