
Market Update

Overview of November 2025:

- Total Requirements forecast shows an average growth of 1.7% for September 2025-August 2026.
- Total Requirements for the 12 months ending November 2025 were 4.17% higher than those of the previous 12 months and saw a 7% increase since October 2025.
- Compared to October 2025, apparent consumption decreased for all dairy products except cheese and Butter which both saw significant increases of 5.8% and 18.4% respectively. For the 12 months ending November 2025 yogurt, cheese and butter all saw significant increases while the other categories all saw decreases.
- Total Quota increased from October 2025 by 6.0% and had an increase of 3.8% for the 12 months ending November 2025.
- P10 production increased by 0.96% in November compared to October 2025 but saw an increase of 3.71% for the 12 months ending in November 2025.
- Butter stocks decreased from October 2025 by 2,221 tonnes to 35,216 tonnes. Butter stocks are expected to be around 39,000 tonnes in August 2026.

January 27-28, 2026

New Entrant Applications

Interested individuals must submit their 5 year business plan and their non-refundable \$100 application fee to Dairy Farmers of New Brunswick no later than January 20, 2026. The Business Plan must include the following: Pro-forma income statements, cash flow statements and balance sheets for two years; sufficient detail on the ownership structure and governance of the business; a description of the proposed dairy enterprise; the education achieved by the applicant(s); and the applicant's agricultural experience. Applicants are also required to provide a signed letter from all their lenders indicating they have seen and reviewed the business plan and agree to provide financing that is stipulated in the plan.

DDPP Update

The letters for the Dairy Direct Payment Program (DDPP) for 2025-2026 were mailed on November 12, 2025. You can register with the codes provided in your letter. Your completed registration must be signed and received no later than March 31, 2026, to receive payment for the year 2025-2026.

Promotion Holiday

In December 2025, producers will see no promotion levy deducted from their milk payments. This one-time levy holiday is in effect for December 2025 production and will be seen on January's payment.

Updated Committees

The updated committees and DFNB Board representatives for 2026 have been finalized. See the listing below. These committees play an important role in supporting the work of Dairy Farmers of New Brunswick and ensuring farmer voices from across the province are represented.

P5 Message

– Quota Increase and Changes in Solids-Non-Fat (SNF) Payment Policy

To maintain the current P5 production of butterfat for 2026, the P5 Boards have approved a 1% saleable quota increase on December 1, 2025.

In addition, the P5 Boards have approved to change the SNF/BF payment policy tier 2 protein to be paid at the monthly 4a price plus \$3.00 per kg, effective January 1, 2026.

A shift in consumer preference to dairy products high in protein (ex. yogurt) since the beginning of 2025, has increased the demand for protein from the market at a faster rate than usual. This shift in demand occurred as there continues to be a decrease of the farm production ratio, which has resulted in shifts in the protein available to serve all markets, and a better return for surplus SNF. As part of the continuous assessment of the payment policy parameters, the conclusion was reached that to meet the recent market demand for increased protein, additional income will be paid on protein in tier 2. The additional \$3.00/kg of protein in tier 2 will increase the value of protein produced up to the no-pay ratio of 2.20 and result in a slight decrease in tier 1 protein price. Further information will be provided on the impact for producers.

The faster than anticipated decrease of the farm production ratio generating less surplus, the growth in profitable markets that utilize SNF and a better global revenue for the decreasing SNF surplus, lead the P5 Boards to implement the above policy change.

The objectives of the component payment policy remain to better reflect market revenue and the components that best contribute to yield, to limit the growth of surplus SNF and to maintain the quality of dairy components, while aiming to ensure a greater equity between producers.

The P5 Quota Committee will continue to evaluate the payment policy and update its parameters as necessary, to ensure objectives continue to be met.

NATURAL PRODUCTS ACT REGULATIONS

Plans for construction, extension, alteration, installation or replacement

50(1) Plans for the construction, extension or alteration of a dairy farm, including a dairy barn, milking parlour or milk house, shall be submitted to the Commission or an inspector for approval before the work is undertaken.

50(2) Plans for the installation or replacement of a farm bulk tank shall be submitted to the Commission or an inspector for approval before the work is undertaken.

Bulk milk graders are trained and licensed to grade milk. They only reject milk according to regulations. Once rejected a producer is required to dispose of that milk and correct the problem that contributed to the rejection and clean their tank before adding their next milking.

Producers are welcome to reach out to the public safety inspectors for assistance in determining the causes for the rejections.

MILK PENALTY FUNDING

Pro-active funding: Producers advised of second or subsequent milk quality infraction, prior to a penalty assessed, is allowed to offset, once per year, cost of a visit from milk quality technician to a maximum of \$1000. Producers may apply for funding by forwarding paid invoices to DFNB office.



QUOTA CORNER

Quota Exchange Procedures

Bids/Offers must be submitted on forms provided prior to 4:00 p.m. on 1st working day of month. All bids must be accompanied by confirmation of funds from your lending institution if bid is greater than prior month's "Due Producer". Producers will not be allowed to combine their "Due Producer" amount with their confirmation of funds from a financial institution to bid for quota equal to the combined amounts. Bids or offers above \$24,000 will not be accepted. Producers selling all of their quota on an exchange will be subject to a security deposit of \$1000/kg that will be returned 30 days after effective date of the transfer.

Minimum Quota Holdings Policy


The Board will cease picking milk up when the farm's total daily quota falls below ten (10) kilograms.

An over quota penalty of \$20/hl is in effect.


Daily Quota Transfer Order

Section 3 b) j); Producers must pay the Board the QESP for the Daily Quota so purchased on or before noon of the 20th day of the month or noon of the first working day thereafter if the 20th falls on a holiday or weekend. Payment received after that is subject to a 2% penalty applied on the value of the purchased Daily Quota and deducted from the producer's statement. The producer will also be prohibited from purchasing on the following month's exchange. If payment is not received by the last working day of month, that purchased quota will be revoked and be offered for sale on the next month's exchange. Any losses incurred from the resale of the revoked Daily Quota will be charged back to the producer along with an additional 2% penalty.

Credit Exchange Procedures

Bids/Offers must be submitted on forms provided prior to 4:00 p.m. on the 2nd working day after the 15th of the month. Results are available on the morning of 4th working day after the 15th. Producers exiting industry may purchase/sell credits one month following effective date of sale. If you do not receive your statement in time to review your credit position, please call the office and we will fax/email your statement to you.

December 2025 Credit Exchange \$14.00/kg

22,165 of the 25,537 kgs offered at or below the CESP were purchased.

Effective May 1, 2025 the 0-day limit was removed which allowed producers to buy or sell regardless of their credit positions.

At a later date, producers with quality penalties will also have the percentage of credits that they can buy reduced for a number of months. DFNB will notify producers 2 months prior to this policy taking effect.



BULK MILK TANKS

All bulk milk tanks needing calibrated will be coordinated by DFNB staff using the calibration services of both Dairy Farmers of Ontario (DFO) . If you are planning to install a new tank or have installed one recently, please call 432-4330 so your farm can be added to the schedule. Before replacing your bulk milk tank remember: New tanks of 1000 US gallons (3780 liters) must have a minimum outlet of 3 inches with a butterfly valve; New tanks less than 1000 must have a minimum tank outlet of 2 inches with a butterfly valve; Used tanks of any size must have a minimum tank outlet of 2 inches with a butterfly valve.

Animal Care Module Update

Active April 1, 2027

The proAction Committee has released 2 updated and 3 new questions that will be included as part of the Code of Practice update to the proAction Program. These are being released now in an effort to allow for time to adapt your facilities and on-farm practices.

AC1 (Demerits)

Unweaned Heifer Housing

Do you ensure that ANY housing for unweaned calves:

- a) Is maintained in good condition to minimize injury and lameness?
- b) Allows calves to easily stand up, lie down, turn completely around, stand fully upright (without touching the top of the enclosure), adopt sternal and lateral resting postures and groom themselves?
- c) Provides a resting surface with enough bedding to achieve insulation, dryness, comfort, traction, and cleanliness?
- d) Permits calves to have visual contact with other cattle?
- e) **Provides fresh air and prevents the buildup of harmful gases, dust and moisture, and reduces the risk of heat and cold stress?**
- f) **If group housing, provides a bedded area large enough to allow all calves to rest comfortably at the same time? Do you ensure that INDOOR* housing for unweaned calves:**
- g) Does not include tethering?
- h) **Do you have a plan for transitioning to pair/group housing by 2031? Do you ensure that OUTDOOR* housing for unweaned calves: i) Allows physical contact with other calves?**
- j) **If tethered, allows calves to have access to an area out of the hutch and must include a collar?**

*Indoor housing is defined as housing that involves a roofed structure with four closeable sides. Calf hutches located under a roofed structure with four closeable sides would be considered indoor housing and must abide by the indoor unweaned calf housing requirements.

*Outdoor housing is defined as housing that does not involve a roofed structure with four closeable sides. Calf hutches located under a roofed structure with less than four closeable sides would be considered outdoor housing and must abide by the related outdoor unweaned calf housing requirements.

AC4 (Demerits)

Dry and Lactating Stocking Density (Demerits)

Do you ensure that dry and lactating cow housing provides adequate stocking densities?

- Free-stall: does not exceed routinely 1.1 cows per usable stall.
- Bedded-pack pens: provide **9.3m² (100 ft²) per cow**.
- Hospital area to house lactating and dry cows must be **9.3m² (100ft²)** of bedded resting area per cow.
- **The scrape alley is no longer included in the square footage calculation.**

*Smaller breeds (e.g. Jerseys) require at least 80% of the space (7.4 m² (80 ft²) that a Holstein cow requires.

AC22 (Major/Minor)

Stanchions – NEW

Do you house any cattle in stanchions?

- Stanchion housing is not permitted.
- Presence of stanchion housing is a Major non-conformance.

AC 23 (Major/Minor)

Newly Built Barns – NEW

Do newly built barns allow for:

- a) Lactating and/or dry cows to have daily, untethered freedom of movement and social interactions year-round?
- b) Cows to calve in an area that allows them to turn around?

- As of April 1, 2024, a newly built barn is defined as a new, separate building or a rebuild of any pre-existing dry and/or lactating housing facility.
- A newly built barn does not include a renovation within pre-existing housing.
- Lactating and/or dry cows must have a minimum of 1hr/day of untethered freedom of movement that allows for social interactions with other cattle, if it is safe to do so.
- Cows must not be tethered at calving and must be able to turn around.

AC24 (Demerits)

Freedom of Movement - NEW

Do you provide opportunity for freedom of movement for cows during the production cycle (calving to calving)?

- In a tie-stall barn where construction of the facility began prior to April 1, 2024, cows must be provided opportunity for movement for a minimum of 55 days in a production cycle, consecutive or not.
- Exercise periods per day must be a minimum of 1 hour.

*It is up to the farmer's discretion to decide when is the best time during the production cycle to offer freedom of movement. Options to offer freedom include, but are not limited to, the following examples:

- Housing lactating cows in loose housing or at pasture
- Housing dry cows in loose housing or at pasture
- Providing regular access to exercise yards and/or pasture for lactating and dry cows year round, weather and conditions permitting
